



**CARDING NOMINATION CRITERIA AND PROCEDURES
FOR THE SPORT CANADA ATHLETE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (AAP)
2023-2024 Carding Cycle**

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| Approval Authority: | Executive Director & Sport Canada |
| Responsible Department: | High Performance |
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| Related Policies: | Canada Snowboard High Performance Program General Policies, & Team Selection Protocols. |

I. GENERAL PRACTICES

- 1) The Carding Criteria are developed as prescribed in Sport Canada’s AAP Policies and Procedures, “*Section 5.5 - Establishing Carding Criteria*”. Specifically, the process is:
 - a) Nomination Criteria and Procedures are developed by the High Performance Program technical and coaching staff;
 - b) These are reviewed by the CS Athletes’ Council and Executive Director and they independently propose recommendations;
 - c) The same draft document is provided to the CS Board of Directors for their review and comment;
 - d) Sport Canada reviews the criteria to ensure they comply with the AAP Policies; and
 - e) Final version of the criteria is approved by the Executive Director, as the Board-delegated “NSO decision making body” for submission to Sport Canada;
- 2) This document is renewed on an annual basis, published and communicated normally 8 to 10 months before the beginning of the carding cycle as recommended by Sport Canada. Approved criteria should be published no later than the beginning of the competition season for the upcoming carding period.
- 3) Canada Snowboard does not make the final decisions regarding the carding of individual athletes but rather nominates eligible athletes for AAP support (carding) to Sport Canada based on the application of the criteria and procedures outlined in this document, and in compliance with Sport Canada’s AAP Policies and Procedures.
- 4) The recommendation of nominees for carding is based on a robust process as outlined in Section V of these Nomination Criteria and Procedures.

II. SPORT CANADA ATHLETE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (AAP) OVERVIEW

- 5) The Athlete Assistance Program (AAP) is a sport-funding program that contributes to the pursuit of excellence. AAP support seeks to relieve some of the financial pressures associated with preparing for and participating in international sport and assists high-performance Canadian athletes to combine their sport and academic or working careers while training intensively in pursuit of world-class performances. The AAP is commonly referred to as “*Athlete Carding*”.

- 7) Athletes approved by Sport Canada for the AAP may be eligible for a living and training allowance, tuition support, deferred tuition support, and supplementary support. Athletes funded by AAP receive a monthly financial stipend (paid every two months) for up to 12 months as follows:

| Card Type | Monthly Stipend |
|-------------------------------------|-----------------|
| Senior International Card (SR1/SR2) | \$1,765 |
| Senior National Card (SR) | \$1,765 |
| Senior Probationary Card (C1)* | \$1,060 |
| Development Card (D) | \$1,060 |

Note: C1 carded athletes are funded at the Development Card level in the first year that they meet the national criteria for a Senior Card even if they have previously been carded at the Development (D) level. If, however, the athlete has been previously carded at the SR1 or SR2 level, has been named to the national senior team, and has competed in World Championships or the Olympics before meeting the national criteria for the Senior Card for the first time, then the athlete will be funded at the Senior Card (SR) level rather than at the Development Card level.

III. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- 8) In order to be **eligible for nomination** by Canada Snowboard to participate in the AAP, that is, to be nominated as a carded athlete, an athlete **must**:
 - a) Be named as a team member of the 2023-24 High Performance Program (HPP), which is defined as the National Team, or Nextgen (Team, Program or Prospect). The HPP selection criteria for all disciplines can be found in the ‘Document Centre’ of the Canada Snowboard Website: <https://www.canadasnowboard.ca/en/docs/>;
 - b) Be a Canadian citizen or Permanent Resident of Canada and have been a legal resident in Canada (student status, refugee status, work visa or permanent resident) for a minimum period of one year before the beginning of the carding cycle. The athlete would normally be expected to have participated in Canada Snowboard sanctioned programs during that time period;
 - c) Compete in snowboard events on the 2026 Olympic program (Parallel Giant Slalom, Halfpipe, Slopestyle, Big Air or Snowboardcross);

- d) Achieve competition results as an individual detailed in section, “VII. Carding Criteria” between July 1, 2022 and June 30, 2023.
 - i. **Team event** results are not eligible for carding nominations.
- e) The athlete, under the Snowboard eligibility requirements of the Federation International de Ski (FIS), must currently be eligible to represent Canada at major international competitions, including World Championships at the beginning of the carding cycle for which the athlete is being nominated; and
- f) Be a member in good standing with Canada Snowboard, as that term is understood in Section 1.1(f) of the Canada Snowboard Bylaws, applied mutatis mutandis.

NOTE: Canada Snowboard recommends that all athletes with an annual income after sport expense deductions of \$50,000 or more, decline AAP financial support. Funds declined in this way are reallocated to other athletes in the same sport whose income is below the voluntary income guideline.

IV. PRIORITIZATION OF NOMINATIONS

- 9) The quota for Canada Snowboard is the equivalent of 29 Senior Cards or \$614,220. Sport Canada normally reviews its carding allocations for all sports after each Paralympic/Olympic Games; therefore, Canada Snowboard’s carding quota may be subject to change.
 - a) Nominations for AAP will be made in the following priority order for each of the three (3) Carding levels:
 - 1. International Senior Card (SR1/SR2)
 - a. Carding Priority Met
 - i. Athlete Score ranking
 - 2. National Senior Card (SR, C1) including Senior Injury Cards
 - a. Carding Priority Met
 - i. Athlete Score ranking
 - 3. Development Card (D) including Development Injury Cards.
 - a. Carding Priority Met
 - i. Athlete Score ranking

Nominations will be made at each Carding level in the order of priority until there are no remaining eligible athletes in the Carding level before allocating cards to the next Carding level and so on, until there are no remaining cards, or there are no remaining eligible athletes. Note: a minimum of 4 months of carding support must be available for an athlete to be nominated.

- b) There will be a minimum of two (2) Development cards (D) allocated to each discipline for a total of 8 Development Cards (\$101,760). If there are less than two (2) eligible athletes that meet the Development criteria in a discipline, then the unused carding amount will be returned to the overall amount for allocation. In the rare case that a card nomination is returned and the nomination of an athlete from Development is eligible for an SR or C1 due

to the available funds, it is possible that the new development card for that discipline would be awarded as a partial card.

- c) Athlete ranking for nomination within the carding priorities will be determined by the cross-discipline Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking List using the athlete’s points. This list will be made internally by collecting data from the FIS Points List for Speed and the World Snowboard Points List (WSPL) & FIS Points list for Freestyle,

1. Freestyle athletes eligible for carding will be ranked on the same scale as speed athletes and will be based on the Speed FIS points rules. Any event that is 700+ WSPL Points or higher (being a world cup or better event) will be calculated on the same point distribution as a FIS Speed World Cup. The athletes’ best two (2) results will be averaged and calculated, which will be the same as the speed FIS list for each eligible athlete. The point scale we will use can be referenced on page 5 here:

Note: All Freestyle Nor-Am events will use the FIS points assigned to them from FIS (This includes the Rev Tours and Air Nation events)

2. For the purpose of the nomination rankings, the Slopestyle and Big-Air disciplines will be considered one discipline, and only Slopestyle results will be used for the athlete score ranking. The other three disciplines will be Alpine including both Parallel Slalom (PSL) and Parallel Giant Slalom (PGS), Snowboardcross and Halfpipe.

Canada Snowboard ‘Athlete Point’ Calculation and Ranking Example:

In the above example, the athletes are first ranked by the carding criteria they have met, SR being Senior International (obtained from a WCH or OLY Top 8 result), then S for Senior National (Results from World

Cups, 700+ WSPL events or higher) and so on. Within the different carding priorities, the athletes are ranked by the Canada Snowboard 'Athlete Points' which is the points earned from their best two (2) results. For freestyle athletes we will calculate their points on the same scale as the Speed FIS list to determine the 'Athlete Points' as the FIS Points List calculates the athletes best two results from the just concluded competition season (carried over FIS Base Points List values from the previous competition season are not eligible to determine an athlete 'Athlete Points' for ranking purposes within the carding priority). In the event that the FIS Base Points List is not published before the AAP Nomination Deadline, Canada Snowboard calculates Speed 'Athlete Points' by the average of the FIS Points earned from their best two eligible results from the just concluded competition season. In the example 'SBS Rider 2's' best 2 results were not from FIS events so the 'Athlete Points' are calculated based on the Speed FIS Points Rules of World Cups where the point scale is distributed as 1st = 1000, and 4th = 500 which averages 'SBS Rider 2's' points to 750 for ranking within Canada Snowboard's process on the same point scale as all athletes in all disciplines. All events below a World Cup level event will use the allocated FIS Points as published for both Speed and Freestyle, this is even the case for high level Rev Tours worth 700 or above on the WSPL as these are technically a Nor-Am we will use the published FIS points for the event.

V. DECISION-MAKING PROCESS

- 10) The Selection Committee will consist of the Sport & High Performance Director (HPD), High Performance Managers (HPM) and High Performance Coordinator (HPC) in consultation with the National Team Coach(es) or appointed technical coach for each discipline. The Selection Committee will evaluate all eligible athletes based on Canada Snowboard's published nomination criteria and then recommend a prioritized list of athletes to be nominated for carding support. The prioritized list is submitted to Canada Snowboard's Executive Director for approval based on the recommendations of the HPP Selection Committee.

- 11) This prioritized list will be posted around May 31, 2022 on the Canada Snowboard website and sent to all members of Canada Snowboard (athletes and coaches) via Canada Snowboard Newsletter (email) of the provisional nominations.

Athletes will have a period of seven (7) days following the notification by newsletter to appeal their provisional status of not being nominated or their ineligibility for carding. Any appeal launched by an athlete will be expedited in accordance with the 'Canada Snowboard Appeal Policy' at: <http://www.canadasnowboard.ca/files/AppealsProtocol.pdf>

Note: It is important to note that the email used for your CS membership account will be the one used for the newsletter unless you have opted out of receiving notifications. To sign up an email there is a newsletter sign up box at the bottom of the Canada Snowboard webpage.

12) Sport Canada reviews all nominations put forward by Canada Snowboard and has the final approval of the nominations in accordance with the Athlete Assistance Program (AAP) policies and Canada Snowboard approved carding nomination criteria.

VI. APPLICATION PROCESS

13) Athletes whose nominations are approved by Sport Canada must complete the following to receive their carding support:

- a) Complete an AAP Application Form;
- b) Sign the Canada Snowboard athlete agreement; and
- c) Complete the CCES online anti-doping courses for the year in question.

VII. CARDING CRITERIA

Field Placing Definition:

A field placing result is not rounded to the nearest whole number because the priority is looking for an actual final finish position result. As a practical example, the dividing line between the top third (1/3) and the rest of the field in a final finish field depth of 58 competitors is at 19.33 so all those who finished 19th place or better are in the top third and those who finished 20th or poorer are not. DNFs and DSOs are counted when determining the field size as those competitors started in the event; however, DNS does not count toward the field size and will be removed from the field size calculation.

14) International Senior Card (SR1/SR2):

International Senior Card (SR1/SR2) Criteria for All Disciplines:

- a) **Only** athletes named to the Canada Snowboard 2023-24 HPP may be eligible for an International Senior Card (SR1/SR2)
- b) Athletes who meet the criteria are eligible to be nominated for carding for two consecutive years (SR1=1st year, SR2=2nd year)
- c) Only eligible results from events on the 2026 Olympic program (Parallel Giant Slalom, Halfpipe, Slopestyle, Big Air or Snowboardcross) will be considered.
 - i. **Team event** results will not be considered for SR1/SR2 carding.
- d) The second year of International Senior Carding (SR2) is contingent on the athlete remaining a member of the Canada Snowboard HPP for the season following their SR1 nomination (or being granted an approval to train outside of the HPP), being re-nominated by Canada Snowboard and maintaining a training and competitive program approved by both Canada Snowboard and Sport Canada.
- e) Sport Canada sets the criteria for International Senior Cards:

INTERNATIONAL SENIOR CARDS (SR1/SR2)
All Disciplines

International Senior Cards (SR1, SR2) are awarded to athletes named to the 2023-24 High Performance Program, and who achieve the following priority:

Priority 1: An eligible athlete qualifies for an SR1 Card if they placed in the top eight (8) and top half (1/2) of the field at the 2023 Georgia Snowboard World Championships (WCH), ranking will be determined by the final result placing.

Priority 2: An eligible athlete qualifies for an SR2 Card if they placed in the top eight (8) and top half (1/2) of the field at the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics (OWG), and are renamed to the 2023-24 HPP, ranking will be determined by the final result placing.

Note: Big Air results that meet either priority will be considered for nomination

If a tie exists within Priority 1 or 2, the tie shall be broken by the Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking determined by the 'Athlete's Points' (which includes frozen FIS points for a health related curtailment of activities).

15) National Senior Card (SR/C1):

National Senior Card (SR/C1) Criteria for All Disciplines:

- a) **Only** athletes named to the Canada Snowboard 2023-24 HPP may be eligible for a Senior Card (SR).
- b) SR/C1 cards support athletes with the potential to reach International Senior Card status. Senior Cards are awarded to members of the HPP on the basis of International Event results.
- c) For the first year an athlete meets the Senior National Criteria, he or she will receive a C1 Senior Card which is funded at the Development card level. If, however, the athlete has been previously carded at the SR1 or SR2 level, has been named to the National Senior Team of their discipline, or has competed in World Championships or the Olympics before meeting the national criteria for the Senior Card for the first time, then that athlete will be funded at the Senior Card (SR) level rather than at the Development Card level.
- d) Team event results will **not** be considered for SR/C1 carding.
- e) An athlete is expected to progress in their results in order to maintain Senior card (SR) status. Five (5) years is the maximum that an athlete will be carded at the Senior (SR & C1) level based on national criteria (carding at a SR1/SR2/D level will not count towards the Five year maximum). After such time, the HPP Selection Committee, in consultation with Sport Canada, will conduct a comprehensive review of the athlete's performances over the past five years in order to assess whether they have demonstrated progress towards meeting the International Senior carding criteria to justify the nomination for an additional year at the Senior Carding level. To do so, the Selection Committee will analyze a variety of elements including but not limited to: the athlete's results and skill

progression compared to the Top 8 performers in the discipline at the International Level; the Gold Medal Profile; and the Podium Pathway data.

- f) Athletes that have reached this maximum number of years as per point e) above will be informed by Canada Snowboard that on top of meeting the SR criteria they must show progression towards being a Top 8 performer in their discipline at the International Level to be eligible for an additional year of AAP support.

NATIONAL SENIOR CARDS (SR/C1) All Disciplines

Senior Cards (SR, C1, SRinj) are awarded to athletes named to the 2023-24 HPP, and who achieve one of the following priorities:

Priority 1: Athletes who place in the Top Third (1/3) at one (1) of the following competitions during the 2022-2023 season:

- FIS World Cup (Speed); or
- FIS World Championships (WCH) ; or
- 800+ point WSPL event (Freestyle); or
- FIS World Cup at a 700 WSPL point level (Freestyle); or
- Athletes named to the HPP who meet the "Health Related Curtailment of Activities" criteria (as described in Section 19 below) and were carded the previous year at the Senior (SR1, SR, C1) level.

Priority 2: Athletes who place in the Top Half (1/2) at one (1) World Cup, or World Championships, and finish the season ranked in the top 25 of the world on their respective discipline rankings as of the latest FIS points list (Speed) or WSPL (freestyle) at the conclusion of the 22/23 season in May 2023.

- Due to the abnormal freezing of points caused by Covid and the recovery plan of the WSPL ranking list, any athletes ranked within the top 25 with frozen points who have not competed since the 2019-20 season will be manually removed from the top 25 and those athletes ranked behind those removed would move up in rank.

Note: Only rankings on the Slopestyle WSPL will be used for Slopestyle/Big Air Athletes. The PAR list will be used for Alpine athletes

Priority 3: This priority is only available to athletes who meet the Senior National Carding criteria for the first time ordinarily for a C1 card.

- **Speed** Athletes who place in the top half (1/2) at a minimum of one (1) FIS World Cup, or FIS World Championships (WCH); or
- **Freestyle** Athletes who place in the top half (1/2) at an 800+ Point WSPL event or a FIS World Cup at a 700 WSPL event level.

If, however an athlete has previously been named to the National Senior Team in their discipline or competed at a FIS World Championships or the Olympics before meeting the national Senior

Card criteria (for the first time), he or she will receive a Senior card (SR). Note: This priority is not available to athletes that have met the Senior International (SR1/SR2) criteria in previous years.

Rankings within the priorities will be based on the Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking determined by the 'Athlete's Points' (which includes frozen FIS points for a health related curtailment of activities).

If a further tie exists in the 'Athlete's points' they shall be broken by the single best (lowest) field placing at an eligible event within the priority until the tie is broken. (field placing = Result / field size x 100).

16) Development Card (D):

Development Card (D) Criteria for All Disciplines:

- a) **Only** athletes named to the 2023-24 Canada Snowboard HPP may be eligible for a Development Card (D)
- b) 'D' cards are intended to support the development needs of younger athletes who clearly demonstrate the potential to achieve the Senior International criteria in the future but are not yet able to meet the Senior National criteria.
- c) 'D' cards are awarded on the basis of the athlete's Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking which will include International/National Event results.
- d) **Team** event results will not be considered for 'D' carding.
- e) Big Air results will only be considered for a 'D' card based on Priorities 1 and 3.
- f) Athletes will be nominated based on the following priorities and as per the nomination process outlined in section IV).

Development Card Restrictions:

1. All Disciplines – Alpine, SBX, SBS/BA, HP
 - a. Athletes previously carded at a Senior level (SR1, SR2, SR, C1) for two (2) or more years are not eligible for nominations under the Development card criteria, unless they were at the FIS Junior age category or in another discipline/sport when they achieved these levels.
2. Alpine and SBX
 - a. Athletes must be under the age of 25 (U25) as of December 31, 2023, which is five years post the FIS Junior Age Category of the 2023/24 season. To determine these age eligibility requirements, Canada Snowboard uses the expertise of a group of technical experts in Snowboard and in Athlete Development who take into consideration a variety of factors, including but not limited to, the discipline's podium pathway, the technical evolution of the

discipline, and the LTAD. According to expert opinion, there is a clear link between the reference to this age eligibility, the performance criteria, and the potential to achieve the international criteria for Senior Cards in these disciplines.

3. HP and SBS / BA

- a. Athletes must be under the age of 22 (U22) as of December 31, 2023, which is four years post the FIS junior age category of the 2023/24 season. To determine these age eligibility requirements, Canada Snowboard uses the expertise of a group of technical experts in Snowboard and in Athlete Development who take into consideration a variety of factors, including but not limited to, the discipline's podium pathway, the technical evolution of the discipline, and the LTAD. According to expert opinion, there is a clear link between the reference to this age eligibility, the performance criteria, and the potential to achieve the international criteria for Senior Cards in these disciplines.

DEVELOPMENT CARDS (D)

A minimum of two (2) Development Cards will be allocated to the top two (2) ranked athletes per discipline based on the development priorities and the 'Athlete's Points'. If there are less than two (2) eligible athletes that meet the Development criteria in a discipline, then the unused carding amount will be returned to the overall amount for allocation as prioritized in Section 9(a) above.

Development Cards (D) are awarded to athletes named to the 2023-24 HPP, and who achieve one of the following priorities:

Priority 1: Athletes who place in the Top 3 at the 2023 Junior World Championships (JWCH). Rankings will be based on the athlete's final results placing at JWCH.

Priority 2: Will be awarded to athletes who rank within the Top Three (3) on their respective 2022-23 Nor-Am Tour. Rankings will be based on the athlete's final placing on the overall Nor-Am tour rankings.

Priority 3: Athletes who place in the Top 8 and Top Third (1/3) of the field at the 2023 Junior World Championships (JWCH). Rankings will be based on the Athlete's final results placing at JWCH.

Priority 4: Remaining cards will be awarded to the highest ranked Development card eligible athletes based on the Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking.

Athletes named to the HPP who meet the “Health Related Curtailment of Activities” criteria (as described in Section 19 below) and were carded the previous year at the Development (D) level. Rankings will be based on the Canada Snowboard Athlete rankings (which includes the athlete’s frozen points).

In Priority 1 & 3: if there is a tie and there are fewer cards than athletes meeting the priority, then to break the tie athletes will be ranked using the Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking. If a tie still remains, then it will be broken by the single best (lowest) field placing result at a FIS Nor-Am event until the tie is broken. (field placing = Result / field size x 100).

In Priority 2: if there are fewer cards than athletes meeting the priority, then athletes will be ranked using the Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking. If a tie still remains, then it will be broken by the single best (lowest) field placing result at a FIS Nor-Am event until the tie is broken. (field placing = Result / field size x 100).

In Priority 4: if a tie remains, then it will be broken by the athlete’s best result (based on FIS Points) until the tie is broken.

17) Athletes Qualifying for Cards in Multiple Disciplines or for both Development and Senior Cards:

- a) An athlete who is eligible for both a Senior Card (SR) and a Development Card (D) must be nominated for a SR Card and cannot be nominated for a D Card unless no SR Cards remain available.
- b) An athlete can only be nominated for a single card even if they meet criteria for multiple disciplines.

18) Health Related Curtailment of Activities Card Criteria:

- a) A carded athlete who, for health-related reasons documented by a Canada Snowboard approved physician, is unable to participate in training or competitive activities shall continue to be carded for the balance of the cycle, provided the following conditions are met:
 1. The athlete does not withdraw from the HPP during that period and provides written confirmation of his or her intention to return to full participation in the HPP at the earliest possible date.
 2. Written evaluation is provided by both the Canada Snowboard coaching staff and a Canada Snowboard approved physician indicating that the athlete can be expected to return to full participation within the next twelve months.
 3. The athlete undertakes, in writing, to train and/or rehabilitate under the supervision of Canada Snowboard or its designate at a level that minimizes

risk to the athlete's personal health and ensures an optimal return to full training and competition at the earliest possible date. Failure to follow such a program without due cause shall be grounds for the immediate termination of the athlete's carding.

b) A carded athlete, who at the end of the carding cycle has not achieved the standard required for the renewal of their carding status after missing at least 15% of events that they would have normally been invited (and planned) to attend strictly due to a health related issue (pregnancy/illness/injury) and the issue has been clearly documented by a Canada Snowboard approved physician (or Physio Lead), or multiple event cancellations due to unforeseen circumstances such as a pandemic may be considered for re-nomination for carding at the same level (C1 carded athletes may be recommended for SR) based on the priority of nominations set in the carding criteria (Point #16) and provided that sufficient cards remain available at that level, under the following conditions:

1. The athlete has not started in eight (8) or more events which will be determined by the competition results throughout the 2022/23 carding cycle (DNF and DSOs will count as a start but DNS will not).
2. The athlete has fulfilled all reasonable Canada Snowboard supervised training and rehabilitation requirements;
3. **Health Related Issue:** A written evaluation to be provided by a Canada Snowboard designated physician (or Lead Physio) indicating that the athlete can be expected to return to full participation during the extended carding period;
Only used for major unforeseen circumstances such as a Global Pandemic: To be considered eligible, athletes who were carded at a SR level (including C1) for the 2022-23 season that were unable to re-meet the carding nomination criteria due to multiple cancelled events must have previously met the SR carding criteria at, at least one of the same cancelled events, at the same location, within the previous two competition seasons. Athletes meeting this requirement will still be ranked within the priority based on the Canada Snowboard Athlete Ranking determined by the 'Athlete Points'. In this case, if the athlete has started in two (2) or more events in the 2022-23 season, the athlete's points for ranking will be determined by their 2022-23 results. If however the athlete was unable to attend two (2) events during the 2022-23 competition season, Canada Snowboard will use their 'Athlete Points' ranking from the previous year.
4. A written evaluation to be provided by the Canada Snowboard coaching staff indicating that the athlete can be expected to achieve at least the minimum standards required for future carding during the extended carding period; and

5. The athlete has demonstrated his or her long-term commitment to the HPP and has stated his or her intention to pursue full high performance training and competition during the extended carding period.
- c) A carded athlete who misses, for health-related reasons documented by a Canada Snowboard approved physician, two consecutive seasons of training/competition due to the same health issue (pregnancy/illness/injury), will no longer be eligible for re-nomination for an “injury card”.

VIII. WITHDRAW TEMPORARILY OR PERMANENTLY

- 19) If an athlete wishes, for other than health related reasons, to withdraw temporarily or permanently from regular athlete training and competition activities (unless Canada Snowboard has authorized them to train outside of the HPP), the normal rules for withdrawal from the Athlete Assistance Program shall apply. The athlete will no longer be eligible for monthly training and living support, but may be eligible, if qualified, for Deferred Tuition or Supplementary support.

IX. APPEALS

- 20) Appeals of the Canada Snowboard AAP nomination/re-nomination decision or of Canada Snowboard’s recommendation to withdraw carding may be pursued only through Canada Snowboard’s review process, which includes an application to the Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada (SDRCC). Appeals of AAP Decisions made under Section 6 ([Application for and Approval of Cards](#)) or Section 11 ([Withdrawal of Carding Status](#)) may be pursued through Section 13 of the ([AAP Policies, Procedures and Guidelines](#)).
- 21) Any member in good standing of Canada Snowboard who is materially affected may appeal a decision of Canada Snowboard with respect to a nomination/re-nomination/withdraw of an athlete to the Athlete Assistance Program. Appeals must be conducted in accordance with the Canada Snowboard Appeals Protocol, which is available on the Canada Snowboard website www.canadasnowboard.ca

- 22) In the event of an appeal, the affected athletes will have their carding support placed on hold until the appeal outcome is finalized. If a nominated athlete is listed as an affected athlete in an appeal, they will be notified by Canada Snowboard that their card has been placed on hold and will be invited to participate in the appeal process, should they choose to do so.
