POLICY STATEMENT: *Canada Snowboard has adopted National and International Anti-Doping Policies for all athletes and other persons participating in the sport of Snowboarding to abide by.*

Purpose

1. To ensure all athletes and other persons participating/competing in the sport of Snowboarding are aware of the Anti-Doping Regulations.

Policy Details:

2. Canada Snowboard has adopted the 2021 Canadian Anti-Doping Program (CADP) as its primary domestic anti-doping policy. Administered on behalf of Canada Snowboard by the Canadian Centre for Ethics in Sport (CCES), the 2021 CADP is fully compliant with the 2021 World Anti-Doping Code, International Standards and Guidelines as they may exist from time to time. 3. In addition, Canada Snowboard, as a member federation of FIS must also be fully compliant with the FIS anti-doping rules. The FIS anti-doping rules may apply to certain members of the Canada Snowboard in certain situations. The FIS antidoping rules are fully compliant with the 2021 World Anti-Doping Code, International Standards and Guidelines, as they may exist from time to time. Procedures:

4. In the event of a conflict between other anti-doping policies established by Canada Snowboard and the 2021 CADP and/or the FIS anti-doping rules, the rules of the 2021 CADP or FIS shall prevail, as applicable.
5. Every athlete and other person participating in the sport shall reasonably cooperate with the Canadian Centre for Ethics in Sport (CCES) or another anti-doping organization investigating anti-doping rule violations and a failure to do so may be the basis for disciplinary action within the sport.
